Chapter 1: The 5-Minute SEO Fix

A simple walkthrough of the hidden SEO issues quietly holding your website back.

I still remember the first time I tried to “do SEO” in 1997. Back then, the advice was basically: cram keywords everywhere and hope for the best. Search engines (Yahoo! and Altavista) were simpler, competition was lighter, and the whole thing felt more like a hack than a strategy.

But a lot has changed in nearly 30 years.

Today, SEO isn’t about tricks.

It isn’t about stuffing keywords or keyword spamming.

And it definitely isn’t about spending hours buried in tools you don’t understand.

Most of the time, the biggest improvements come from small, simple fixes, the kind you can spot in minutes once you know what to look for.

That’s what this chapter is about.

Think of it as a guided tour of your website from Google’s perspective. Together, we’re going to look at your pages the same way search engines do: quickly, logically, and with zero patience for confusion.

By the end of this chapter, you’ll know exactly where your SEO is helping you... and where it’s quietly holding you back.

Let’s begin.

Page Titles

Imagine a search engine scanning your website right now.

It doesn’t know your business or anything about your services.

It’s trying to figure out **in seconds** what each page is about.

Your page title (also called a *title tag*) is the first and strongest clue you give it.

As you look at your homepage and top service pages, ask yourself:

- **Does the title clearly describe what the page is about?**
If not, Google has to guess, and guessing rarely helps your rankings.
- **Does it include a keyword someone would actually search for?**
Not jargon. Not internal language. Real-world search terms.
- **Is it written for humans, not robots?**
A good title should feel like a headline, not a keyword dump.

This is the moment where search engines decide whether your page is relevant. Clarity wins. Confusion gets ignored.

Chapter 3: Headings (H1s & H2s)

Chapter 5: Images & Alt Text

Chapter 6: Page Speed

Caching saves a temporary version of your page so it loads faster the next time someone visits.

Quick Wins

When someone searches for a business “near me,” Google isn’t just looking at your website. It’s looking at dozens of small signals across the web to decide whether you’re a real, trustworthy, local business worth showing in the results.

Most business owners don’t realize how many of these signals are missing, inconsistent, or outdated.

A wrong phone number here.

An old address there.

A half-completed Google Business Profile.

These tiny details quietly push you down the local rankings.

This fix is about tightening up those signals so Google, and your customers, know exactly who you are, where you are, and how to reach you.

NOTE: Google Business Profile is designed for true local businesses. You need either a physical location where customers can visit you or a realistic service area where you can actually travel. Many virtual businesses try to list the entire country, but that can get your profile flagged or removed. Keep your service area local and accurate as it’s what Google expects. I’ve seen businesses lose their profile because their service area was too large.

Clarity First

Imagine someone searching for your service in your city.

They’re ready to buy and comparing options. They’re looking for the business that feels the most legitimate.

As you review your local presence, ask yourself:

- **Is your Google Business Profile fully completed?**
Photos, hours, services, description. Remember, all of it matters!
- **Is your business name, address, and phone number consistent everywhere?**
Even small differences confuse Google.
- **Is your website clearly tied to your location?**
Your city or service area should appear naturally on key pages.

Local SEO is about clarity and consistency. **It’s not about tricks.**

JVF Jargon Decoder: “NAP”

NAP stands for Name, Address, Phone Number. These must match everywhere your business appears online.

Relevance & Intent

Now imagine you're the customer.

You're searching because you want something nearby such as a service, a store, or a professional you can trust.

Your local signals should reassure them instantly.

Look for:

- **Recent reviews**
Fresh reviews show you're active and trustworthy.
- **Accurate business hours**
Nothing frustrates customers more than outdated hours.
- **A clear service area**
If you serve multiple towns, list them.

These elements tell both Google and your visitors:

"This business is real, active, and ready to help."

JVF Jargon Decoder: "Local Pack"

The Local Pack is the group of three businesses that appear at the top of Google for local searches.

Performance

Local SEO isn't just about visibility — it's about engagement.

Google tracks how people interact with your business listing:

- **Do they click to call?**
- **Do they ask for directions?**
- **Do they visit your website?**

The more engagement you get, the more Google trusts you.

Check your listing for:

- **High-quality photos**
Real photos outperform stock images.
- **A helpful business description**
Explain what you do in plain English.

- **Accurate categories**

Choose the category that best matches your primary service.

A complete, active profile feels trustworthy — and trustworthy businesses rank higher.

Your primary category tells Google what your business is. Choose the one that best matches your main service.
